► BEWARE OF TAX SCAMS

Beware of Employee Retention Credit schemes The IRS continues to see <u>third parties</u> <u>aggressively promoting Employee Retention Credit schemes</u>. Payroll professionals also report receiving undue pressure from their clients to claim the credit.

- Fraudulent promoters are pushing ineligible people to file a claim for the credit, while charging the filer either large upfront fees or a fee that is contingent on the amount of their refund. Plus, they're not informing taxpayers that they must reduce the wage deductions they claimed on the business' federal income tax return by the amount of the credit.
- Filers should carefully review the ERC guidelines before trying to claim the credit and be wary of offers promising tax savings that are too good to be true. The ERC is a valuable credit for those who qualify but claiming it improperly could result in taxpayers having to repay the credit along with potential penalties and interest.

Employee Retention Credit | Internal Revenue Service (irs.gov)

• The Employee Retention Credit (ERC) is a refundable tax credit for businesses that continued to pay employees while shut down due to the COVID-19 pandemic or had significant declines in gross receipts from March 13, 2020 to Dec. 31, 2021.

Missed the April 18 filing deadline? File now to limit penalties and interest

• The IRS urged taxpayers who missed Tuesday's April 18 tax-filing deadline to file as soon as possible. Taxpayers who owe and missed the deadline without requesting an extension should file quickly to limit penalties and interest.

When an IRS letter arrives, taxpayers don't need to panic, but they do need to read it

• Getting a letter from the IRS can make some taxpayers nervous – but there's no need to panic. The IRS sends notices and letters when it needs to ask a question about a taxpayer's tax return, let them know about a change to their account or request a payment.

Mistakes happen: Here's when to file an amended return

• Even after making every effort to file a complete and accurate tax return, mistakes can happen. When a taxpayer realizes that the tax return they filed has a math error, missing income or other mistake, they may wonder if they need to correct it by filing an amended return.

The IRS offers easy and convenient options to make federal tax payments

 Anyone who needs to pay their federal tax bill has several ways to send a payment to IRS quickly and securely. Knowing the options to make payments helps taxpayers meet their tax obligations.

Stay Up to Date on Form 1099-K Changes

• A new reporting threshold for Form 1099-K, Payment Card and Third-Party Network Transactions, began in tax year 2023. Encourage your clients to keep good records now for the next filing season.
